Continuity of Care in Nursing: Continuity of care plays an important role in

It is the coordination of health care services by health care providers for client where they meet needs that have arisen as a result of disability, accident or illness during moving from one health care setting to another and between and among health care professionals.

Care recognises the woman's right to self-determination in terms of choice, control, and continuity of care from a known or known caregivers Care encompasses the needs of the baby, the woman's family, her significant others and community, as identified and negotiated by the woman herself

Nursing is vital to the success of positive patient outcomes and it critical that the nurse makes appropriate nursing decisions and takes appropriate



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measures for each patient encounter. Certain aspects of care present a risk of disrupting the continuity of care. One of these is medication administration.

## **Midwifery Continuity of Carer Model Tool-kit ...**

The continuity of care is facilitated with the safe admission, transfer and discharge of clients. An admission is defined as the first, initial client contact. A transfer, in the context of this review, is defined as the movement of the client from one area to another area within the same healthcare facility; and a discharge is defined as the cessation of care and services to a client.

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
